Washington State SAR Message from the President

Dear Compatriots and Friends,

Imagine, if you will, that the morning news carries the following headline:

"Governor Issues Executive Orders"

You read the article intently, to learn that the Governor has issued several Executive Orders, to take effect immediately: First, that Puget Sound be closed to all shipping for the indefinite future. No ships may offload or take on cargo. No ships may enter or leave Puget Sound. Any vessel attempting to disobey the order will



be forfeited, along with all property found thereon. Second, that the Washington State Constitution is revoked. Third, that State and National military forces are authorized to occupy privately owned homes, and to take possession and control of all vacant buildings. No one may contest the Executive Orders. Anyone attempting to resist may be tried, at the convenience of the government, within or without what has been known as the State of Washington.

You are stunned by the news. Your mind reels. What does it mean? What do you do now?

This is not fiction. It occurred. Only the location, the date and a few of the details were changed. The place was Massachusetts, 250 years ago.

We cannot fully fathom what went through the minds of those who read the words... fear, anger, disbelief, confusion. How could this possibly occur? What did it mean? How would it affect life for my family? Will armed soldiers come into my home, and occupy my bedrooms? What will happen to my family, my home, and my possessions? Should we flee? Where would we go?

We now know that the deeply rooted, instinctive human response to trauma is to fight back, flee danger, or freeze in place. Some become hypervigilant, anticipating potential threats at every turn, and distrusting everyone. Some become emotionally detached, trying to distance themselves from the events. Some become numb to other people, feelings, experiences and circumstances, to protect themselves from trauma.

Even within families, the response was unexpected, unstable, inconsistent, and uncontrollable. Society, as they knew it, ceased to exist. No one knew who they could trust. Best friends, family members, and neighbors now all posed risk. In a moment, life changed. Death lurked around every corner, and in every conversation.

But there were those men and women who, despite everything, put everything at risk, and took action. We remember them as our Patriot ancestors.

250 years ago, men and women whose faces, families and fortunes we know only from words consigned to the pages of history, left in their DNA, their actions, and in their firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, a nation founded on the principles of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

They must not be forgotten.

It is for us to be dedicated to their unfinished work. Would we, like them, mutually pledge to one another our lives, our fortunes and our sacred Honor, that this nation conceived in liberty not perish from the earth?

It is a hard question, worthy of our best consideration. In our small way, we do so every time we gather, every time we honor our Patriot ancestors, every time we reaffirm our faith in the principles of liberty and our Constitutional Republic, and solemnly pledge ourselves to defend them against every foe.

As we prepare to gather in Ocean Shores, I urge you to reconsider your commitments, and to decide how far you are willing to go to honor them.

Cindy and I wish you all a joyful Easter, and we look forward to seeing you in Ocean Shores.

Spokane Flag Museum

When Stan Wills opened the flag museum 15 years ago, He wanted to educate people about flag history. Since then, He has added over 100 replica flags and several antique flags. The flag (pictured at right) was recently donated to the Flag Museum by Bob & Sue Bowers of Spokane. It was part of a George W. Shields flag collection that they had purchased. The flag is an original silk flag dated from 1877-1890. It measures 72" X 75" and is too large to display. Stan has archived it per national antique flag guidelines and will display a picture of it. There are many things that make this flag very unique. First it has 39 stars. The global star configuration, instead of stars in a row. Stars in a row did not become flag code until 1912. The stars are hand sewn gold thread. The Coast Guard logo is printed on it. There are



only 20 known 39-star flags to exist and none have this star configuration and none have gold stars.

The best guess is that it flew on a Coast Guard Ship in the Great Lakes from 1877-1890. In 1876 our country flag had 38 stars and when Dakota was proposed to be the 39th state flag makers started making a 39-star flag, but congress decided to spilt Dakota and make it two states, North & South Dakota. The sent flag makers to create a 40 Star flag. Before the 4th of July when new states were added to flags, two more states were added, Washington & Montana. This created a need for a 42-star flag and made the 39 & 40 star flag obsolete.

However, on 3 July 1890 Congress added another state, Idaho making it the 43rd state and a need for a 43-star flag. On 4 July 1890 our flag went from 38 stars to 43 stars. This made the 39, 40, & 42-star flags obsolete but very valuable to collectors. Very few were made or survived. Stan Wills, Spokane Flag Museum

Spokane #1 Chapter

On Saturday 20 Jan, Stan Wills presented the **Outstanding Sea Cadet SAR Community Service Award** to Cadet Landon Grace. The presentation took place at the Spokane Battalion Awards ceremony



George Rogers Clark Chapter

The George Rogers Clark Chapter's connection to the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence grew closer to July 4, 1776, when President Lew Maudsley, founding President Art Dolan, and Awards Chairman, Dick Moody visited member Warner Gibson Taylor III at his home in Puyallup.

Ninety-three-year-old "Gib" is a direct descendent of Benjamin Harrison, one of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence. Harrison, a delegate from Virginia, also presiding over the Continental Congress during its final consideration, described by the National Archives, as a meeting that "...continued through all of July 3 and into the later morning of July 4. The Declaration had been officially adopted."

President Maudsley presented Gib with a framed Silver Good Citizenship medal. The mounting was adorned with a small plaque of the SAR logo and the SAR's 250th Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence logo. The mounting included a small plaque reading:

George Rogers Clark Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, Presents the Silver Good Citizenship Medal to Warner Gibson Taylor III honoring his ancestor Benjamin Harrison signer of the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776.

Alexander Hamilton Chapter

Operation Ancestor Search

On a gloomy winter's day, Compatriots from the Alexander Hamilton Chapter head over to Joint Base Lewis-McChord (JBLM) bringing cheer to the Wounded Warriors convalescing at the Soldier Recovery Unit The Compatriots represent the Chapter's outreach efforts in Operation Ancestor Search (OAS), which is a free national genealogy training program for Wounded Warriors and their families. The effort to connect Wounded Warriors with their ancestral roots has been spearheaded by Compatriot Rodger Dent and joined by Compatriots Keith Weissinger and Timothy The team has been visiting the Wounded Warriors at least once per month for the past few years. OAS is a program initiated by the SAR and generously supported by Ancestry.com who has contributed a \$180,000 grant over three years. The goal is to assist the Wounded Warriors in connecting with their ancestral roots.

A survey conducted by Ancestry.com in 2022 showed that 53% of Americans could not name all four of their grandparents. However, 66% of respondents said they want to learn more about their family history and 51% want to read stories about when their ancestors were young and what life was like back in the day.

The Wounded Warriors have embraced Alexander Hamilton's OAS team enthusiastically. During the last OAS meeting, they found out one of the Soldiers is a 6th generation Washingtonian: his ancestors came to Washington Territory on the Oregon Trail.

This underscores the fact that searching for ancestors is like prospecting: the more you look the more you find. Occasionally, you find a nugget of gold. Submitted by Timothy Smith

DAR "America 250!" Project

In July 2026, the United States will mark its 250th anniversary.

During this National Semi quincentennial Celebration DAR chapters across the nation are working to leave a lasting impact on their communities through meaningful local projects and events.

The National DAR Society introduced a new America 250 project in 2020. https://blog.dar.org/introducing-new-dar-america-250-patriots-marker

The WA State DAR Chapter Regents Club (CRC) will take part in the project and will place two (2) bronze markers, created by the National DAR society and produced by Classic Bronze Resources. One to be placed on each side of the state.

Donations at any level are happily accepted and those of \$500 or more will receive special recognition either on a supplemental plaque or on an accompanying QR code. So far, 17 DAR chapters are participating.

The Washington State project is called "CRC WA East/West America 250!" and is a collaboration amongst the Chapter Regents Club, DAR Chapters in WA State, patriotic groups, and individuals. America 250! memorials will be located at South Pines Cemetery in Spokane Valley in a Patriot Plaza being created and at the Mountain View Memorial Park in Lakewood. The (cement) bricks on the east side will be installed at a Patriot memorial, and on the west side, they will be installed on the grounds of the Rainier Chapter House in Seattle, a full-sized replica of Mt. Vernon.

The memorials give tribute to America's 250th Anniversary and the engraved patriot bricks (described below) will be a special tribute to our individual patriots.



Engraved bricks will offer a unique and lasting opportunity and will be a special tribute to all of our individual Patriots so their names will be acknowledged in our state as the instruments of our freedom. Bricks will be sold for \$60 each until May 2, 2024. The bricks will have the patriot's name, service, and colony of service. Order one for each of your patriots or any proven patriot you wish to honor

We hope that SAR will join us in honoring patriots through the purchase of the bricks. You are welcome to participate in the monuments and/or the Patriot Bricks. Join us! Dedications will be held. Funds received will be used for the project, with any extra donated for patriotic causes.

Alexander Hamilton Chapter

Their second presentation was to 4th to 8th grade. There was a total of approximately 34 youngsters with all kinds of questions.


